This past year 2018 was phenomenal for us as an organization. The week-long event attracted over 250 active participants who were resolute on learning new skills that could fetch them a livelihood. We launched our first ever annual Back-to-School event where we gave school supplies to 300 students in Amuwo Odofin metropolis, Lagos Nigeria. We also recorded our highest revenues so far since inception. All these are testaments to the efforts of our team of volunteers and committed sponsors who continue to appreciate the work that we do to change lives and give hope to upcoming generations in Africa. In this report, we will unpack all above highlights so you can see how we are making judicious use of the resources committed to our care.

Finally, we believe we, that is, YOU and US, are a team in this work. To this end, our mantra has *changed* to reflect this belief. May I invite you to please join me as we echo it together: ***Together, We Make Dreams Happen!***

Corporate Update

- In February 2018, The Economic & Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) in Nigeria issued our SCUML (Special Control Unit Against Money Laundering) Certificate to allow us to proceed with the opening of an official bank account in Nigeria. This certificate puts all our financial activities under the jurisdiction of EFCC for ongoing monitoring and audit as needed and/or required by the Nigeria Government. Although, the certificate showed it was issued in November 2017, in actual fact, it was issued to us in February 2018.
- An official corporate bank account was opened at Access Bank, Nigeria in March 2018. Consequently, all financial transactions were effectively carried out from the corporate bank account.
- Annual filing (Form 990-N) with the United States Internal Revenue Service – IRS, was completed in April 2018. This is the required filing 501c3 for nonprofit organizations with less than \$25,000 in revenue for the year. With this filing and other requirements, Dream Rite continues to hold the highly esteemed 501c3 designation which makes all donation to us a tax deductible donation for all our donors.
- Late filing for Annual Report filing with the State of Maryland was completed in December 2018.
- Dream Rite, Inc. continues to remain in good standing with all government regulations.

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Programs

SEED Scholarship Program

We completed the third year our pilot scholarship program in June 2018 with the graduation of our two beneficiaries from high school (*picture on the right*). This pilot was an opportunity for the application of lessons learned in the design of the full scholarship program.



This program is also known as the SEED Sponsor-A-Child Program – which is the part that interfaces with sponsors in providing scholarship

opportunity to our scholarship recipients. The objective of the SEED Scholarship Program is to provide opportunities for students to attend private secondary school with better and quality education than is obtainable in public schools. The scholarship was opened to any of the cities covered within the metropolis of focus at the time of the marketing and program launch. The publicity of the SEED Scholarship was initiated in March 2018, but the program was officially launched in September 2018. Students who would be promoted to terminal classes (Junior Secondary School 3 & Senior Secondary School 3) were excluded from the scholarship eligibility. This is by design of the scholarship program and is to enable us to obtain enough information on the recipient’s eligibility for the scholarship for the following year.

The plan was to have the scholarship run in two different metropolis – Ikorodu and Ajegunle, Lagos Nigeria. These two metropolises cover two local government areas – Ikorodu Local Government and Ajeromi-Ifelodun Local Government respectively. We sent official notification to government officials responsible for Education at the two local governments to help in disseminating information to public school within their local government. We also engaged active paid social media public adverts to get the word out. Scholarship application period was from March 12, 2018 – April 14, 2018. Applications were centrally submitted on our

website – a separate scholarship application portal was developed for this purpose. Applicants were required to write 3 separate essays as part of the application process.

Following the application period, a third-party review panel was set up which consisted of trained academicians. The panel reviewed the ninety-two scholarship applications received and forty-one of them were deemed qualified for the interview/testing phase. A third-party entity prepared a scholarship test questions appropriate for each academic grade-level where scholarship was available for. The test consisted of English Language and Mathematics. The scholarship test was administered on Saturday, April 28, 2019 exclusively by Dream Rite and was conducted at one of the locations of Livingstone Colleges in Ikorodu, Lagos, Nigeria. All forty-one applicants qualified for phase two of the scholarship process were invited, thirty-nine showed up and two were disqualified upon verification of their actual academic class.

We had a benchmark qualification score required to determine successful scholarship application and soon after the scholarship test/screening exercise, we were able to arrive at our chosen candidates. On May 23, 2019, we published the outcome of the screening exercise and notified successful candidates of their scholarship awards. Of the thirty-seven candidates that took the test, sixteen of them were on merit list, while five of them were placed on borderline list. The candidates on the merit list were those with automatic scholarship slots in the order of their stellar performance in the test and based on available scholarship slots at the time. The borderline obtained an acceptable score, however, we had to wait to make provision for scholarship slots for them.

The best performance in the scholarship test came from a ten-year old candidate – Basit Mololuwa Azeez, who was in Junior Secondary School (JSS1) at the time. His profile can be found here on our website – <https://www.dreamrite.org/basit-azeez>. His future ambition is to be a Neurosurgeon. In his words, “I want



to become the best Neurosurgeon in the world like Dr. Ben Carson. I pray Almighty God will grant my request and to fulfill my dream and make it come true in life.”

The following is the outcome of the SEED Scholarship Screening Test conducted on Saturday, April 28, 2018. A total of 41 candidates were invited for the test, but only 37 candidates took the test. Eventually, scholarship slots were made available to the remaining five candidates and all twenty-one successful candidates entered the final phase – acceptance and documentation phase. One of the successful candidates declined the scholarship, while another candidate failed to show up for the mandatory scholarship stakeholders meeting. At the end of the entire scholarship process, nineteen scholarship recipients emerged and were duly processed. Four of the scholarship recipients were retained at their current highly esteemed government model colleges (Government Junior Model

College, Owutu Ikorodu & Lagos State Civil Service Senior Model College, Igbogbo Ikorodu), while fifteen of them were processed into their new schools at various annexes of Livingstone College, Ikorodu, Lagos Nigeria.

The first annual scholarship stakeholders meeting was held on Friday, August 31, 2018. Stakeholders at this meeting include scholarship recipients, parents, school administrators, and Dream Rite SEED Scholarship Program team. During this event, the Executive Director did an extensive review of the program guideline and addressed all questions and concerns raised. Importantly, performance guideline for scholarship

evaluation and renewal was stressed and all stakeholders agreed with the established criteria. Scholarship recipients were presented with some of their school supplies.



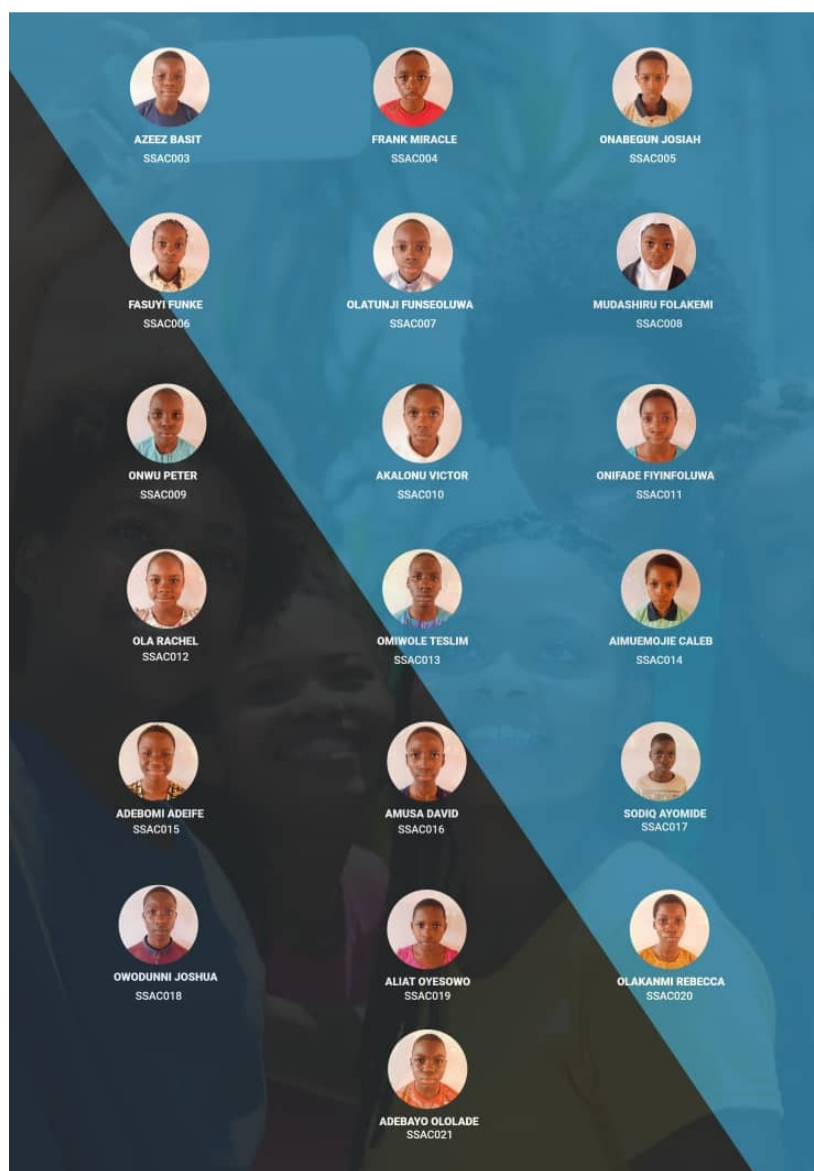
All finalists were from Ikorodu metropolis. Unfortunately, despite much effort to provide the scholarship to students in Ajegunle metropolis, there were only about six applications received from that area out of the ninety-two applications received. None of the six applicants qualified beyond phase one of the scholarship process. We will revisit availability of the scholarship opportunity for students in Ajegunle metropolis and other metropolis in the future.

This program was also designed to provide an avenue for mental and leadership development of the scholarship recipients. A non-academic requirement of the program is for recipients to commit to completing at least four leadership books in a year. These books were carefully selected by Dream Rite SEED Scholarship Program team and distributed to recipients by the Program Manager every quarter. By design, recipients are required to write up a three-part summary of book in an effort for us to evaluate how well they understood and are applying the concept learned. The book focus for the first quarter of the scholarship engagement (September – December 2018), was “Uncover Your Potential” by Dr. Myles

Munroe. The book summary by the scholarship recipients are posted periodically on their profile page on our website. The book focus for the following quarter (January – April 2019) is “Why Some Positive Thinkers Get Powerful Results” by Norman Vincent Peale.

Mentoring engagement was also part of this program design, however that part is yet to but expected to take off this year 2019. Scholarship recipients will be paired with mentors around the world whose career focus aligns with the recipient’s interest and future ambition.

Gifted Hands Skills Acquisition Program

This program designed for economic empowerment program and it is tailored towards providing in-demand skills training and development that aligns with basic economic potential in the community. In 2018, we returned to Ajegunle metropolis where this program attracted over 250 participants over a 5-day period.

This is the 3rd edition of the annual Gifted Hands Skills Acquisition Program. We introduced new skills training and eliminated some based-on feedbacks and evaluations from the previous year's program.

Participants registered for the program directly on our website. The program was held from Monday, September 3, 2018 through Friday, September 7, 2018 at 84, Oluwa Street, New Road, Olodi-Apapa, Lagos Nigeria. Special thanks to Pastor Rotimi Akinwale for securing the location for our use. The program ran from 10am to 3pm every day. Skills taught during this year's program were:

- Shoe Design – by Shola Awoyelu of Yelu Republic
- Introduction to Computing/IT – by Kayode Olatunde
- Turban, Hat & Fascinator – Gloria Ashie & Gloria Ebhodaghe
- Visual & Pencil Artistry – Ayomikun Ojoade & Stephen Oguntimehin
- Basics of Sewing – Glory Omojiade & Christopher Oghuman
- Soup Cooking (African Cuisine) – David Matthias & Temitope Akinwale
- Generator Repair – Peace Nwanosike

Except for the Shoe Design trainer whose business was paid and contracted for the service, the rest of the trainers gave their service to us pro bono as part of their contribution to the mission. The zeal of the trainers and entire volunteer workforce for this project was palpable. They traveled from far and near defying the odds to be part of this community initiative. A few volunteers had to leave their home as early as 5am in hope of eluding the traffic congestion in the area to get to the venue on time. Unfortunately, some of these volunteers still spent several hours in traffic despite their early rising.

The participants were obviously overtaken by the sheer knowledge they were acquiring for free. It was all hands-on, as everyone was engaged in the making of proofs of their new knowledge. We saw new talents

emerge from those who did not yet appreciate the potentials within them. We were wowed by the young participants in the Visual & Pencil Artistry class as they began to put their pencil to work to deliver beautiful drawings. Each participant had something to make during the week-long exercise and they left better equipped than they came. Although, the trainings offered were basics due to based on the training curriculum we designed and time constraint, each class offered participant enough skills to at least venture into the business to start making economic gains for themselves.

As is customary since inception of this program, we usually incorporate an empowerment seminar as part of the program. The theme of the empowerment seminar in 2018 was **D.A.R.E – Doing Above Relative Expectations**. Throughout the program, participants were challenged to set high expectations for themselves, and not only achieve those expectations but to exceed them.

We had a Keynote Speaker everyday during the empowerment seminar which ran for about 45 minutes including the keynote session and questions & answer session. The following were the keynote speakers for each day:

- Thursday, Sept 6, 2018: Olalekan Dada – CEO, WebHome Nigeria Ltd
- Friday, Sept 7, 2018: Rotimi Akinwale – Managing Partner, Hedgestone Capital Partners

One of the key strategic offerings this year was the Google Digital Marketing training conducted by a Google trained specialist (Olanrewaju Opeolu – Lead Consultant at Lanet Systems Ltd) on behalf of Google for Africa. The training focused on online business opportunity, business building and branding online among others. Participants were given e-Certificate of attendance issued by Google and an opportunity for development of a free website for qualified business entities.

At the end of the week-long program everyone had the opportunity to display the proofs of their newfound skills. A skills test was conducted in each class and top participants were given takeaway items that aligns with their new skills. Notably, four laptop computers were given out to participants in the Introduction to Computers/IT class and one complete generator set was given to the best participant in the Generator repair class.

This program could not have been successful without the significant efforts of our volunteers who gave of their time and skills throughout the program execution. We will like to specially mention and appreciate all volunteers for this program as follows:

Back-To-School Program

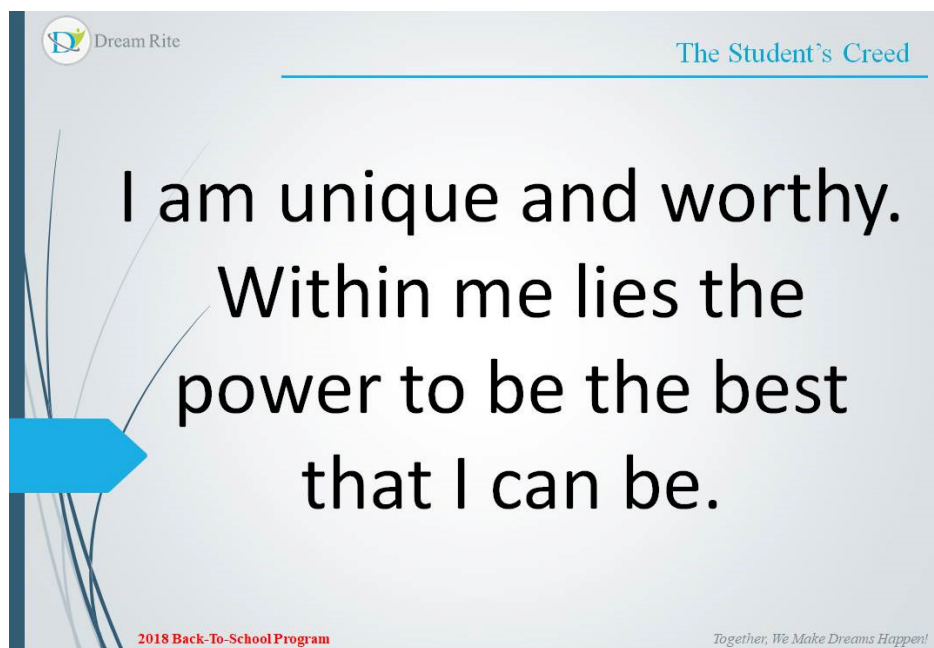
This program is an initiative and opportunity to engage the student community for the greater good of empowering and equipping them with needed tools as they return to school for the new school year. It is projected to hold every year shortly before the new school year begins. Additionally, this program is an avenue to distribute school supplies to students in the community. For this inaugural edition, we targeted 300 students in the Amuwo Odofin metropolis. And yes, we met this goal.

Online registration was made available to register the 300 participants and was supplemented with onsite registration. The program was held on Saturday, September 8, 2018 from 10am till 3pm. The room was full, the expectation was high, the students longed for the school pack handouts, but we made them wait till the end as we had a fully-packed program agenda.

The core of the program is the opportunity to infuse hope and motivation into the students as they return to school. We had a keynote speaker specially engaged to speak life and hope into the hearts of the students. The Keynote Speaker, Tosin Babasanya-Craig, a multi-talented professional, a trainer, career coach and motivational speaker did a fabulous job in engaging and equipping the students with motivational nuggets. We also had a panel questions & answers session to further engage the students. On the panel was Tosin Babasanya-Craig, Olusola Sodeinde (an educator and former Director of Quality Education, Lagos State Ministry of Education) and Olalekan Dada (CEO, WebHomes Nigeria).

The children had lots of fun and asked very brilliant questions. It was apparent that they were prepared for such an opportunity like this to ask burning questions. The questions cut across different categories, including quality of their education in school, teacher's lack of motivation, inter-personal relations in school and at home among others. The panel came prepared as they answered all the children's questions to satisfaction.

One of the major highlights of the program was the recitation of the Student’s Creed. It was as if we wrapped a million dosage of courage within the creed – and truthfully, we did. In fact, the simple yet profound words of the student’s creed were intentional crafted to echo in reverberation an infusion of hope into the minds of the students. The room was supercharged as everyone recited the Student’s Creed.



The program ended with the distribution of the prepared school packs for the 300 children present. The school pack includes: a backpack, several notebooks, pens, dictionary, mathematical set (a mini toolbox for mathematical exercise). Light refreshment was served.

The program planning team did a great job putting this event together. Special thanks to all our volunteers for their time and effort both throughout the planning and execution of this program.

How You Can Help

As seen throughout this report, the work before us is enormous with so much to be done than has been accomplished.
